
WATKINS HALL UPDATE 21-22


MILLER HALL UPDATE 21-22

STARTING TO RETURN TO NORMAL

KITCHEN 8 RETURNS TO THE HALLS FOR 2021-22 EVENTS

Hopes were high that the Fall semester of 2021 would see the return of in-person Kitchen 8 events with Watkins and Miller Halls. The last inperson gathering had taken place in January of 2020 to celebrate Elizabeth Miller Watkins's birthday. Almost 20 months later, a crowd gathered in the backyard of Watkins to share ice cream treats and friendship. This was a modified version of our traditional New Resident Dinner where we join together to welcome the new residents and introduce them to their K8 alumnae. Typical homemade salads, rolls, and brownies were replaced with individually wrapped ice cream treats in order to comply with KU's Covid guidelines, but the feelings of comradery were the same. New residents were given a copy of the recently redesigned New Resident Booklet and stories were shared by alumnae.

In January 2022, as we approached EMW's birthday, the Omicron variant of Covid was again disrupting normal life. The decision was made to return to an online only format for the birthday party. Cookies decorated in lilac were delivered to each hall along with gifts from their

"wish list." Miller requested new throw pillows and a Bluetooth speaker. Watkins asked for new baking gear and a stand mixer. Norma Hoagland was in the process of down-sizing, and was generous enough to donate her large stand mixer to the hall. I'm sure it will have a great second life at Watkins churning up all kinds of yummy treats!



and is looking forward to getting more involved with Kitchen 8 in the future. When she was asked how the Elizabeth Miller Watkins Memorial Scholarship impacted her life she said, "Without the scholarship, KU may not have been a realistic option for me." She went on to say that while she had some other funding through grants, loans and some smaller scholarships the EMW scholarship had a huge part in her being able to pursue her educational goals at KU. "I remember getting the award letter in the mail... My mom and I were sitting in our car in the driveway as I opened the envelope. I was so excited, I probably squealed or cried, or both. It was really life changing."

Although Gannon did not live in the scholarship halls, she found a sense of community in Kitchen 8. "I came from a very small hometown, and even after transferring to KU after two years of college, I wasn't prepared for how huge it would be. The ladies at Kitchen 8 gave me a sense of community outside of my part-time jobs." She distinctly remembered her first annual meeting with Kitchen 8, "I remember going to my first meeting with my mom, who was incredibly supportive, and we were so impressed with the organization. Everyone was so friendly and welcoming, let alone how impactful the scholarship dollars were to my education." (continued on next page)

She shared that the scholarship and the women at Kitchen 8 were so impactful during her time at KU, that she encouraged other friends to apply for the scholarship or to consider the scholarship halls. She wishes that she could have gotten to know the scholarship hall ladies better while at KU, but is incredibly thankful that the scholarship was open to those living elsewhere. "Seriously, even after being away for several years, I cannot say thank you enough. And thank you for encouraging continued involvement as an alumna."

Members Near and Far Attend First Virtual Annual Meeting

The spirit of Elizabeth Miller Watkins drew together alumnae, residents, and scholarship recipients for Kitchen 8's first virtual Annual Meeting on April 24, 2021. Although we were unable to gather together in person, Zoom fatigue was not apparent as members happily greeted each other. We welcomed many first-time attendees, as the online format provided a new opportunity for our out-of-state members to attend the meeting. An online poll revealed that residents from the 1970s and 2010s had the most representation at the meeting.

Kitchen 8 President Paula (Hopkins) Wrigley kicked off the meeting, reflecting on our collective perseverance during the pandemic. Paula poignantly noted that Elizabeth Miller Watkins faced many of the same challenges during the 1918 flu pandemic that we are facing today. But as Watkins Alumnae Chair Liz Arends and Miller President Hunter Owsley discussed in their State of the Halls address, residents are successfully adapting to college life during a pandemic. In both halls, the sleeping porches have transitioned into larger study rooms, with residents sleeping in their smaller study rooms. Residents have also found unique and socially-distant ways to socialize, including sharing meals outside. Despite these challenges, as Miller President Hunter noted, residents now have more pride doing their chores and living in Watkins and Miller, knowing the rich history of the halls.

President Paula presided over the business portion of the meeting. Because K8 did not hold an Annual Meeting in 2020, the first order of business was approval of the 2019 Annual Meeting Minutes. Kitchen 8 Treasurer Norma (Decker) Hoagland then presented the Treasurer's Report followed by proposed archive guidelines, on behalf of outgoing Historian Sarah Garten. In the near future, Kitchen 8 plans to gather a committee to review Kitchen 8 records and mementos in line with these recordkeeping procedures.



Dr. Sarah Bell giving her presentation



Kathleen said, "Judy was injured in an automobile accident and was confined to a wheelchair for the rest of her life. After her recovery, she continued to teach business and accounting courses at the Junior High School where she was employed at the time of the accident." Judy had lived in Los Angeles, California.

ANN BECKMAN

Opernhaus Zurich's director of studies Ann Beckman has died at the age of 69. Beckman, a native of Kansas, United States studied piano and conducting. After graduating, she worked as a pianist and musical assistant at the Portland Opera and later as a song accompanist for the Berkshire Music Center. There, she worked alongside Leonard Bernstein, Aaron Copland, and John Wustman.

She would also be hired by the Lyric Opera of Chicago as a Musical Assistant and in 1978 went to Germany to work at the Deutsche Oper am Rhein in Düsseldorf and the Bayerische

Staatsoper. In 1986, she became director of studies at the Théâtre Royal de la Monnaie in Brussels and in 1992 she moved to the Zurich Opera House where she became the director of studies for 20 years. She was also the pianist and musical assistant to conductors Riccardo Chailly, Marc Minkowski, Nikolaus Harnoncourt, and Franz Welser-Möst. (continued on next page)

Beckman also supervised productions at the Théâtre du Châtelet, L'Opéra National de Paris, and the Festival de Radio France in Montpellier.

Ann grew up in Concordia, Kansas and lived in Watkins Scholarship Hall from 1969 to 1973. Her roommates were Norma Decker Hoagland, Debbie Flint Shores and Elena Wahbeh. Ann was a piano major. Norma remembers walking with Ann to Murphy Hall. She would sit outside Ann's practice room and study, while listening to Ann play. She also credits Ann with her love of opera, which was unknown to Norma until Ann insisted she attend KU's production of Die Fledermaus. She said, "when I moved into our room at Watkins, Ann had the biggest stereo setup I had ever seen! She introduced me to so many kinds of music." They stayed in touch throughout the years and Norma visited Ann in Zurich several times. Ann passed away from a recurring heart artery aneurism and donated her body for study to the Zurich Medical School.

ROSELYN SKONBERG GEORGE

Roselyn Skonberg George, beloved wife, mother, grandmother, and great-grandmother, passed away peacefully on August 21, 2021 in Monument, Colorado. She was born on January 20, 1927, on the family farm in Rapp Community, Osage County, Kansas. She was the first of four daughters born to Hazel Lynch Skonberg and John Victor Skonberg. Roselyn attended Rapp Grade School, a one-room country school in Osage County, Kansas, and graduated from Osage City High School in 1945. After receiving an Elizabeth Watkins Hall Scholarship, she attended Kansas University, graduating in 1949 with a Bachelor of Science degree from the School of Education. Her time at Watkins Hall provided her with lifelong friendships; her active involvement with Kitchen 8, the alumnae organization for Watkins and Miller Scholarship

Halls, gave her the opportunity to help other students as she had been helped.
In 1949, she accepted a contract to teach Home Economics at Lowther Junior High School in Emporia, Kansas. At a faculty picnic in September, she met her future husband, Douglas George, who was on the Emporia High School faculty. They were married on June 18, 1950, and together raised three daughters, Susan, Sara, and Laura. Roselyn made special doll cakes for their birthdays, scones for Saturday morning breakfasts, and after-church Sunday dinners - the table set with the good china, silver, and crystal. She sewed school clothes, prom dresses, wedding dresses, and veils. She knitted sweaters, made quilts, and taught them sewing and needlework skills.

After their daughters were grown, Roselyn and Doug built a farm near Quitman, Texas. Roselyn was hired as the Quitman Public Librarian in February 1978, serving for ten years. When she began, the library was located in a small house. With her efforts and those of others, the library was moved to a large, former bank building in the center of town. She wrote grants, organized a GED program, built up a collection of over 11,000 books, and worked very hard to make the library a welcoming place for all residents. In 1985, she was awarded Librarian of the Year by the Northeast Texas Library System. (continued on next page)

Roselyn and Doug moved from their farm to Loveland, Colorado, in 1990 to be closer to their daughters and eleven grandchildren. She volunteered as a librarian at Interweave Press and was a member of Mountainview Presbyterian Church, organizing their Prayer Shawl Ministry. Several of her Kitchen 8 friends received shawls made by Roselyn.

She and Doug took wonderful trips together and attended many Elderhostels. In her 80's, Roselyn became interested in genealogy. She researched family history and wrote two blogs – The Lynch Clan about Irish ancestors and Letters to Spakarp about Swedish ancestors. She traveled to Sweden to stay with cousins and see important ancestral sites, including Spakarp.

Visits by grandchildren, individually or with siblings or cousins, were the highlight of her life. They could always count on homemade cookies in the cookie jar and homemade cinnamon toast for breakfast. On Grandma Days, a grandchild got time by themselves with her for a special activity of their choice. She made a quilt for each grandchild's high school graduation, using special fabrics for that child.

In October 2017, Roselyn and Doug moved to Bethesda Gardens Assisted Living in Monument, Colorado. Photos of the grandchildren and great-grandchildren covered their walls. In her 90's, Roselyn's computer skills enabled her to exchange emails, photos, and texts with the family, visit via FaceTime, and follow KU basketball and Rockies baseball games with a grandson. Her hands were busy knitting prayer shawls and dishcloths for family, friends, and caregivers. As a lifelong learner, she continued to learn and read books. She received wonderful care from the staff at Bethesda as well as from Abode Hospice.

Roselyn and Doug were married for 68 years before his death on August 7, 2018. He gave a dozen roses to her on seven specific times each year, leaving instructions to continue this after he was gone. She will be greatly missed by her Lilac Lane Sisters.

RITA GATLIN CREWS

Kay Sullinger Wible, Miller Hall 1974-78, sent the following message to Kitchen 8: I wanted to let you know of the passing of Rita Gatlin Crews. One of her younger sisters is also an alumnus. We sadly lost Rita to cancer on January 30. Some of you may recall that Rita, Bonnie Pearson Viner, and I attended the Kitchen 8 Annual Meeting and Scholarship Awards Brunch and shared the story of our "Round Robin"



group of five women. Marina Stewart Maimer and Debbie Tilghman Packard are the other two. We were all very honored and surprised to have KU Alumni Magazine print our story about 40+ years of connectedness. God began weaving our five lives together in 1974 and the bonds remain strong today. Marina, Bonnie, "Tillie" and I are heartbroken at the loss of unforgettable Rita, but grateful to have had the gift of her. And thankful for Miller Hall, where it all began.

If we can hold our 2022 Annual Meeting and Scholarship Awards in person on April 23rd, we will invite the residents to be our guests at the event.
